Manor Road Continues to Evolve with Help from the Manor Road Merchants Association

The Manor Road Merchants Association (MRMA) wants to see you at its restaurants, bars, shops, and venues—and Mondays are a great day to do that. “Manor Mondays” are one of the promotions organized by this two-year-old business association aimed at improving the accessibility, visibility, and economic viability of the area. The mission is to make the Manor Road area a destination for food, drink, entertainment, shopping, and other services.

MRMA was created through the City of Austin’s Souly program, an incubator for merchant associations that has provided training, grant money, and tools to the group.

“We want people to eat and shop, drink, relax, and be entertained,” said Melissa Vogt, MRMA president and managing director of

the Vortex Theatre. “Souly has been really helpful about advocating and connecting us with those who will help us get things done.”

One of MRMA’s goals is to make the one-mile commercial stretch of Manor Road into a cohesive business district. Among some of its completed projects are the placement of the M Bike Gateway sculpture at the Dean Keaton Road-Manor Road triangle, where the district begins; the decoration of utility boxes; and additional bicycle racks. “We’re most excited right now about the progress we’re making on the improvements and beautification at the Manor Gateway site, the addition and repair of sidewalks in the district, and the initiation of the Pedestrin Hybrid

Beacon locations (something that we’ve tried to get going since the association formed!),” Vogt says.

Manor Monday promotions include happy-hour specials at the Vortex, food discounts at Patrizi’s, giveaways, and special menu offerings at Unit D Pizzeria. Vogt will be designing a series of posters to highlight the specials each month.

MRMA members hope to encourage more neighborhood residents to visit the area and also to attract a wide range of customers to the unique offerings on Manor Road. “It would be short-sighted if we didn’t think big,” said Shalou Barth, a founding board member and owner of Unit D Pizzeria. “To really thrive we must reach beyond Manor Road. But the neighborhood is our core. Without Cherrywood and the surrounding communities, we wouldn’t exist.”

Grackle Green Micropark Neighbor Sustained, Neighbor Maintained

The city's Neighborhood Partnering Program is breaking ground on Grackle Green, CNA's new micropark and playground, in April at 2702 Drury Lane. This grassroots community project is neighbor sustained and neighbor maintained.

first business sponsor), CG&S Design-Build (thanks for providing AutoCAD drawings), and The Great Outdoors (thanks for making tree donations). Cherrywood illustrator Caitlin Alexander is putting the finishing touches on the "I-Spy" design for the entrance gates and posters. Her work has been generously supported by the City's Urban Forestry grant.

Vida Pura Juicery Extends the Torres Family Legacy on Manor Road

Veronica Torres helped her parents open Mi Madre's more than twenty-five years ago. She's thrilled to partner with her father, Edgar Torres, in a new venture just down the road in the former in.gredients location: Vida Pura Juicery.

Edgar credits juicing with his recovery from cancer, as well his chill approach to life. Veronica got into juicing after she saw how it improved her father's well being, and wants to share that positive experience with her neighbors. When the in.gredients location became available, they jumped on the opportunity to bring Vida Pura to Manor Road.

The Flea spoke with Veronica and Edgar in late January while the store was undergoing renovations in preparation for opening day, February 8. The two showed off their industrial-strength juicer—the heart of the business—and chatted about how Vida Pura became a reality.

Veronica says, "I want to be a bridge to the community [by sharing mine and my dad's experiences with juicing]. I want to welcome Latino people, who sometimes don't drink or eat very healthy. I'm Latina and I want other Latinos to know that you don't have to be vegan to come in. I say, 'Come in, have a juice—see how it changes you!' Juicing changes your life, one juice at a time. I want this to be for everyone."

Opening Vida Pura has been a great experience for the father-daughter duo.

Veronica reflects, "We've bonded so much more here than any other time in my life. We've grown so close, and that's so important to me. What else can you ask for?"

Vida Pura will serve juices, smoothies, açai bowls, grab-and-go salads, vegan soups, avocado toast, and freshly prepared guacamole and chips. Veronica says, "We're going to start simple and add more and more as we go." They also plan to open the outdoor space for community activities, like free yoga classes.

Patterson Park Projects to Break Ground

2018 was a banner year for Patterson Park. The year closed out with a Roots & Wings Festival celebrating trees and pollinators and a glowing display of luminarias over the holidays. The Roots & Wings pop up was part of a city-wide celebration of Arbor Day and Monarch Appreciation Day. There were nature-based crafts, a tree ID scavenger hunt, story time, and self-guided tours of the community garden's butterfly gardens.

Friends of Patterson Park was awarded two major grants in 2018 totaling \$98,000; both projects will be installed and unveiled in 2019. The Austin Park Foundation is funding new playground equipment, seating, and a small natural play area featuring large tree stumps. The Neighborhood Partnering Program will fund new park furnishings, including grills at the small pavilion, recycling containers, benches at the volleyball and tennis courts, a picnic table and boulder seating by the *Dance of the Cosmos* sculpture, cedar trail markers and an information kiosk with a map designed by neighborhood illustrator Caitlin Alexander.

The grants required both financial and volunteer hour matches, and we are so grateful to the folks who helped mulch Patterson's heritage oak trees during It's My Park Day and the neighbors and business sponsors who have donated to Amplify Patterson campaigns, including Nature's Treasures, Franklin Barbecue, Thunderbird Coffee, Urban Patchwork, Nicole Cooper Realty, and Erin Tassoulas Design + Build.

Going Green: Maplewood Becomes an Eco School

Maplewood's Green Team of students, parents, and staff are working toward recognition as a Green Flag Eco-School. Sponsored by the National Wildlife Federation, Eco-Schools USA is a program that aims to empower students to be future environmental leaders.

The Green Team reached Bronze-level certification in recognition of their work on waste and transportation. The team hopes to achieve

The Green Team is led by librarian and campus innovation coach Amanda Braziel and parents Sara Montoya and Dianne Folkerth. It has grown from twenty students when it was formed in 2015 to seventy-five today, and includes kids in monthly activities to improve the sustainability of school grounds, facilities, and community-building activities.

"Initially our students were very concerned about the amount of waste generated in the cafeteria at breakfast and lunch every day," Braziel says.

"We also noticed that many classrooms and the cafeteria lacked recycling bins. That led

Silver certification in this academic year by improving wildlife habitat, increasing biodiversity on campus, and continuing to reduce energy and water consumption. The Maplewood PTA secured two recent grants from the CoA to help the school achieve this goal: a second Bright Green Future grant to expand the courtyard pollinator garden and an Urban Forest grant to plant more trees around the campus. Students will plant pollinator-friendly plants and will be responsible for watering the new trees until irrigation is installed in the spring.

Folkerth says, "Being 'green' and good stewards of the environment is something that's important to our community, and that translates to our school community. We have some passionate kids at Maplewood who are motivated to enact school-wide changes. For example, they take turns helping classmates sort recycling and compost at lunch so that it becomes habit for everyone."

"We owe so much to Amanda Braziel for making this idea into the wildly popular club that it is today. She recruited a team of teachers and volunteer parents who'll keep Green Team going, and she helped create a generation of young environmental stewards for our city. That's huge! We are also grateful to the administration at Maplewood, which has been very supportive of our efforts throughout the years."

East Austin Blackland Prairie Home to a Symphony of Summer Frogs

With an excess of seasonal rain in Central Texas, East Austin's Blackland Prairie meadow is rich with plentiful native grasses, masses of wildflowers, and thriving woodlands.

Among the myriad species of mammals, reptiles, and amphibians that call Blackland Prairie home, the rainy season is most appealing to Central Texas frogs, which means it's a great time to take the family out to listen to the chorus of frog calls.

Frogs and toads produce an array of calls and songs during their courtship rituals. Each species has a distinct call. The callers, usually males, announce their location, and the females respond. Individual frogs must compete with hundreds or thousands of other frogs to be heard amid the chorus call. Many websites provide audio clips to help you identify a frog species' unique call. A great resource to get you started on this fun (if unusual) hobby is http://animaldiversity.org/collections/frog_calls/

Stop by Boggy Creek at Willowbrook Reach or

Cherrywood Green to see if you can

hear the frog chorus!

If you're interested in protecting amphibians or conducting your own frog chorus, one of the best things you can do is install an amphibian-friendly pond in your backyard. An even simpler way is to create a "toad house," knocking a hole in a flower pot and turning it upside near your water faucet.

Keep your garden diverse with native grasses, shrubs and wildflowers to continue to provide habitat for wildlife and enjoy your own backyard symphony!

FUN FROG FACT

With their two-stage life cycle and water permeable skin, amphibians are sensitive to a wide variety of environmental pollutants. Amphibians are considered "sentinels" of environmental health because of their absorbent skin.

Cherrywood Coffeehouse Celebrates 10 Years!

Jen Haberman is co-owner of Cherrywood Coffeehouse, the neighborhood's one-stop-shop for coffee, brunch, yoga, live music, and community. You'll find Haberman in the shop almost daily, running coffee to your table or greeting you behind the counter. *The Flea* interviewed her with an ear toward getting to know her better and commemorating the ten-year anniversary of the neighborhood's iconic gathering place.



Flea: Are you a morning person or a night person?

Haberman: I'm definitely a morning person. I wasn't always that way but definitely am now.

Flea: Do you drink regular or decaf?

Haberman: Caffeine, but only a double shot a day.

Flea: What do you think your best day on the job has been?

Haberman: That's a good question. You know, there's so many days that stand out. The SXSW days are always kind of crazy, but whenever there's a good bunch you remember those. We occasionally work with a group called Keen [King]. They sometimes meet here and Jared Leto did a surprise visit with the students that were working with that organization. So he came out, there was a choir, they performed a couple of songs, and that was really fun and exciting.

Every day, people come in and sometimes say "I just got into town and the first place that I came was Cherrywood," or someone will thank us for something that we did for the school or the church. Those remarks make a day feel like a great day.

Flea: What is the craziest thing that you remember happening at Cherrywood?

Haberman: Lots of things happen here. Once during SXSW, the train that runs behind us was stopped in its tracks. Someone had stopped on the tracks and during the middle of SXSW that train was just stopped for about an hour. That was kind of crazy.

This past year, it was the water boil. Those were interesting days! We stayed open, there were several hours the first day when we were setting everything up that enabled us to serve coffee, but we were here.

Years ago, a street crew hit a gas main on 38 1/2 Street. They evacuated the whole area. I wasn't at the shop when it happened but I got the call. One of the city workers ran inside and said "every-

body evacuate!" The cooks, the staff, everyone had to get out really quickly, leaving food on the grill—everything. That was probably one of the most exciting days. We were locked out for several hours while they were working on it.

Flea: What keeps you up at night?

Haberman: You always want everybody to have a good positive experience, so if something happened that you don't really have control over, and your service wasn't as good as it could have been, or the wait was too long: I used to worry about that a lot in the beginning, and those were the things that would bother me. The things that I couldn't control were the things I worried didn't reflect well on us. Over the years, I think we've learned a lot. I feel that if people know what to expect that helps. During SXSW, there are occasionally ticket times of 30 minutes or more, but I feel that if people know "Hey, we're really busy," then they understand, and that's the key.

We're doing the best that we can do. Things are going to go wrong occasionally and we're going to try to fix them and make them right and that's pretty much all you can do.

Flea: What keeps you going?

Haberman: The day-to-day of stuff. We are really fortunate to have so many people come in here on a day-to-day-basis, and we are so fortunate to have people thank us for what we are doing. That's what keeps me going. It's a good feeling, that we are nurturing people, but at the same time I feel that it nurtures us as well. What's so funny, is that people compliment me on the coffeehouse, but I don't think I'm the one who is responsible for it. So much of the community feel is because of the people who come in here. They create that atmosphere more so than we do. I'm just providing a space, which I'm happy to do!
