Eat-in and Ire over Restaurant Highlights Neighbor Response to Commercial Growth in Cherrywood

IN JUNE, dozens of Muellerites attended a Mueller Neighborhood Association "eat-in" at Kerbey Lane Café to encourage the restaurant to open a fifth location in Mueller. Meanwhile, subscribers to Cherrywood's NeighborNet listserv argued the pros and cons of a Kerbey Lane at one possible location proposed by a developer: 4020 Airport. Though the use restrictions on 4020 make it an unlikely spot for a 24-hour operation like Kerby Lane, the discussion raised several issues about the benefits and drawbacks of commercial growth in Cherrywood.

Parking, Safety & Property Values

"It's a huge deal for the neighbors on Vineland, Schieffer and 40th Streets to NOT have a 24-hour business at their back fence. Specifically, none of us in the immediate neighborhood are looking forward to overflow parking onto adjacent streets OR longer hours. (Think how Thunderbird and Cherrywood Coffeehouses are affecting owners' use of their homes, property values, and all neighbors' safety.)"

Cherrywood Supports I-35 Makeover

In June, The Cherrywood Neighborhood Association submitted a letter of support to the City of Austin for the Reconnect Austin plan, a vision of local architects and planners to "cut and cap" I-35 from Ladybird Lake to 15th Street, resulting in a tunnel for through traffic below-ground, and local streets at ground level. It would look much like pre-1950 East Avenue, with uninterrupted cross streets and open, pedestrian-friendly areas. "Reconnect Austin" would not only take care of the traffic and eyesore and free up an estimated 30 acres of land, it would also heal the concrete divide that separates two parts of town.

Several other cities have had success with similar projects, and it can happen in Austin with enough citizen support. Cherrywood joins Downtown Austin Neighborhood Association and other civic groups in endorsing the plan. Given enough momentum, the I-35 cut-and-cap could conceivably be extended north of 15th St., bringing the benefits even closer to Cherrywood territory.

18TH FRENCH PLACE 4TH OF JULY PARADE



Compromise Sought for Community Garden

In May, Austin's Parks and Recreation Department denied The Patterson Park Community Garden Task Force's application for a community garden, largely due to ongoing opposition from a group of nearby neighbors. However, when the task force told PARD we would appeal to City Council, PARD agreed to work with us and members of the opposition to achieve an acceptable compromise.

The task force has developed an alternate site proposal that moves the garden further north and relocates the volleyball court to address concerns about open space in that portion of the park. Getting the new proposal approved will likely take up most of the fall, effectively delaying garden installation until at least June 2014.

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URBAN FARM UPDATE

Between now and the beginning of the fall/winter season in mid-October, the half-dozen backyard and front-yard plots that make up the farm will still produce summer crops like eggplant, okra, tomatoes, and cucumbers. During that time, our dedicated core group of work-share members will also further develop our two newest plots, which are still at about half-capacity, building up the soil and installing drought-busting drip irrigation systems.

Signup for the fall/winter season begins mid-August, with several ways to participate as a member: full cash subscription; full workshare; half and half; or land host.

Pardon Our Appearance

Big projects going on and coming up at the Reach

Project #1: Habitat Restoration Project Phase I

FLWR is adopting Watershed Protection's "Grow Zone" policy, which focuses on not mowing around Austin waterways to decrease water pollution and improve wildlife habitat. FLWR has planted more than 100 trees and shrubs and seeded the entire Phase I area (the upper northern and western portion) with native grasses and perennials. The temporary watering system will be removed when Phase II begins.

Project #2: Wastewater Line Replacement

From this summer to next spring, the city is replacing aging wastewater lines, which will require bank stabilization and some tree removal. Other than impacting surrounding streets, the project will affect the lower southeastern portion.

Project #3: Habitat Restoration Project Phase II

This phase, in the lower southeast portion, will begin after the wastewater line replacement project. FLWR is still planning this restoration, but it will look much like Phase I, with planting, seeding, and temporary irrigation.

Cherrywood Tree Planting in October

This year's 16th annual Cherrywood tree planting will benefit Cherrywood Green, as well as the neighborhood's beautiful tree canopy that remains the envy of Austin. To date, the program has planted 490 trees. Don't take for granted the great trees we have in Cherrywood—it's vital we plant more to compensate for the trees we lose every year! Fall is the best time to plant trees in Austin: they have all winter to develop a good root system to survive our hot, dry summers.

STUCK ON "STUCCOVILLE"

The haunted house and hero cop of Giles Place

The Giles family put an indelible stamp on the architecture and layout of Cherrywood, especially in the subdivision that bears their name. Their involvement with the neighborhood began with Banton Giles, one of the early 20th century investors in our slice of east Austin. Banton was born in Travis County in 1870, his father's family having moved to the Republic of Texas from Virginia. He and wife Leora owned one of the first homes in the Cherrywood area, a mansion at 2824 Manor Road that would later become Value Sky Park by the time the airport replaced the farm and pastureland.

Banton and Leora had six children, five girls and one son, James Bascom, a noted Texas land commissioner. Leora passed away in 1945 and Banton died in 1952, leaving the house vacant. Long time Cherrywood resident Jeanne Whittington remembers how neighborhood children in the 1950s considered the wood-frame Victorian a haunted house. Stories persisted of doors opening and closing unaided and other mysterious noises. No one dared venture there after dark.

From Hauntings to Housing

Bascom and sons, Rogan and Bascom, Jr., started developing Giles Place (the area we affectionately call "Stuccoville") out of the Giles family holdings in early 1947. They designed and built Giles Place from 1947 to 1950 with returning GIs in mind. The crews put up the one-story tract homes like an assembly line, pouring the foundations for the entire block before assembling the walls all at once, followed by the windows and doors. Primarily built from volcanic ash blocks imported from Mexico, the houses ranged in size from 800 to 1,000 square feet. Many have identical floor plans, though several were built much larger. Giles homeowners have expanded their houses over the years, in some cases doubling their size to 2,000 square feet.




Enter Burt Gerding, Austin Legend

Our neighbor, Burt Gerding, was one of the construction hands on those first Giles Place homes. Fresh out of the Navy after serving as a pharmacist mate onboard ship, Gerding got the job from his brother-in-law, Reggie Smith, who worked for the Waco company that sold Giles casement windows. The pair installed and glazed the windows for six cents a pane.

Gerding, who passed away in March, moved to 3211 Hemlock with his wife, Mildred, in 1951. In 1956, the family moved over to one of the very homes Gerding had helped build 10 years earlier, 3801 Vineland. Born in Greenville and raised in Dallas, Gerding joined the Austin Police Department in

1950, where he became a lieutenant in the Criminal Investigation unit. He was instrumental in the James Cross murder investigation, and was one of the first officers on site during the Charles Whitman University of Texas Tower shooting. *Texas Monthly's* 1986 "The Madman on the Tower" story recounted his experience:


"He grabbed his .30-06 Springfield with armorpiercing ammunition. He took up a position on the roof of the business and economics building off the Tower's southeast corner and doesn't mind admitting now that before he got sighted in, the first shot went high and put the most conspicuous hole in the Tower clock's translucent glass face. After that, he hit a bag of cartridges that Whitman had set on the parapet and maybe one of Whitman's rifles, which appeared to have been struck by an armor-piercing bullet."

Thorne Dreyer, in a 2006 *Texas Observer* article, describes Gerding as "a wry, lanky gent with a winning style, ... an Austin legend. Omnipresent, with

a continually amused look and an almost 'aw shucks' demeanor, he was the town's one-man 'Good Cop, Bad Cop." Gerding told me stories of his work during the Vietnam-era peace marches of the early 1970s, recalling how he would take equal pleasure in helping the Guadalupe Street protestors and macing them too when the situation called for it. I would gladly remind him that I was most likely one of the protestors on the receiving end of his mace canisters!

Gerding leaves behind his former wife of 49 years, two children, six grandchildren, seven great-grandchildren and many friends. His little dog, Asta, preceded him in death. We will miss them both.

2908 French Place: Beauty and Balance

Once a neighbor driving by Lawrence Haley and Dan Hart's yard stopped the car, reversed, rolled down the window and proclaimed their garden was a gift to the neighborhood.

Since moving in, Haley has improved the original landscaping by replacing the perennials with native and native-adapted plants to cut down on maintenance without compromising the beauty and balance of the yard. The flowers from the plumbago, esperanza, hibiscus, magnolia, Texas mountain laurel, and agapanthus draw migrating hummingbirds and butterflies. Knockout roses bloom along the fence framed by purple fountain grass. Foxtail fern thrives near the green of the zoysia palisades turf. A more delicate bloom, a duranta, trails tiny blue flowers that smell of French vanilla.

If you see Haley or Hart in their yard, be sure to tell them their yard is a gift to the neighborhood.

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


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
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
WHAT'S HOT IN CHERRYWOOD

Seven Tips to Feng Shui Your Bedroom
