CNA Steering Committee begins work

twice since its members were
elected at the October General
Meeting. The Steering
Committee's function (in case
you haven't memorized the
bylaws yet) is to conduct the
business of CNA between
General Meetings and to
research issues and make
recommendations to the
membership.

The committee began its duties on November 18 by electing officers. Jim Walker was selected to serve as Chair, Priscilla Boston as Vice-Chair, Rebecca Kohout as Treasurer, and Lisa Carroll as Secretary.

The committee also acted on December 21 to improve the distribution system for The Flea. Each of the 13 members of the Steering Committee will now take responsibility for delivering the newsletter to all homes, apartments, and businesses in a specific area. Members will survey their areas to make sure that a sufficient number of issues are printed. A further motion was approved to raise the price of advertising in *The Flea* to \$30 for a business card-sized ad in order to pay for rising printing costs.

The committee's current challenge, one to which a good deal of discussion has been devoted, is to identify important neighborhood issues as a first step toward developing policy options and seeking neighborhood consensus. It is important for CNA to have established

policies, since the city is increasingly involving neighborhood associations in the planning process. Crucial issues include (but are not limited to) traffic, zoning, crime, airport redevelopment, Maplewood Elementary, litter, communications with the city, and green space.

Determining various policy alternatives and gauging neighborhood opinion will not happen overnight, but the Steering Committee feels that it is essential to begin the process now. As the city grows around us, we must construct a vision about what we as a neighborhood want in order to protect our interests.

Cherrywood website adds services referrals



Letter to the Editor

Dear Flea,

There has been much said and written about the "Smart Growth" policy the city is formulating. It seems to me that most of what I've heard in our neighborhood is from people who want to add duplexes and second residences to any-size lot just to make some money, regardless of what their neighbors think. I think there are a number of people who live in our neighborhood that want it to stay a single-family neighborhood but have been quiet about the issue. I think it is time for these folks to voice their opinion because I think it is very possible that this neighborhood will have many more rental units and the associated problems that come with unplanned increased density. Problems such as more crowded streets, more stress on utilities (i.e., lower water pressure), and more renters means less stability, and possibly more crime.

One reason that is very important to me is that I bought in this neighborhood, in part, because it was a single-family neighborhood. If I wanted to live in a duplex-type neighborhood or in a condo neighborhood, I'd bought in one. Changing the rules in the middle of the game doesn't seem like the right thing to do. Especially so some greedy investors can make money at our expense.

Those of us that want to keep our neighborhood one of single-family residences better speak up now before it is too late.

Follow Your Nose...

...to Hoover's Cooking, the new restaurant opened up at the old Discovery Incubator at 2002 Manor Rd. You can smell the incredible smoked ribs, wings and chicken from our street (30th). Since we first ventured there, we have made it a weekly family outing. Nothing is as comforting as a good neighborhood restaurant, with a familiar menu and familiar faces. After a long day at work and a seemingly longer commute home, thoughts of cooking and/or getting back in the

car to drive to a restaurant are equally daunting. Hoover's Cooking is a godsend for the car and kitchen weary.

The menu has something for everyone, on almost any diet or budget. Oh, there will be days when nothing but an order of those hot and tender smoked Aus-Tex Wings (\$4.99) will do. But when health sense prevails, there are tasty alternatives. The (porta)Bella Muffaleta (\$5.99) is

uniquely different and absolutely delicious. The mushroom has a rich, smoky perfume and a firm, juicy texture that stands up perfectly to the piquant olive salad and chewy bread. When paired with one of Hoover's "house mates" (one of a selection of 12 different side dishes comes with the sandwich), it provides a big meal and then some, with enough left over for a late-night or next-day snack.

The Charbroiled Catfish (\$7.99, with choice of two house mates) is also a big hit. We've only tried it Cajun style, but it is also offered in Lemon-pepper. Sweet, succulent and spicy, it feels and tastes like more of an indulgence than it really is.

The faint-of-palate can aim for a meat and potatoes dish like Chicken Fried Steak and a gargantuan helping of terrific mashed potatoes and green beans (\$6.99), but I find Hoover's handling of savory spices to be

irresistible. The Jamaican Jerk Chicken (\$7.99) tastes island-born, and my Louisianabred husband has no complaint about the New Orleans Muffaleta (\$5.99), though he does always ask for extra olive salad.

The dinner salad (a house mate, ala carte, \$1.69) is a great foil for the spicy entrees. The raspberry vinaigrette is very tasty and offered on the side so the salad stays cool and crisp and is drenched only to the extent that you drench it.

So far, the entrees have been so satisfying, I have not been able to consider dessert, but the word on the street (again, 30th) is that the Chocolate Icebox Pie (\$2.99) is a not-so-little slice of heaven.

What you must not miss is the pitcher of freshly squeezed Homemade Lemonade

(\$1.49). It will furnish your whole vitamin C requirement for the day. But before you drink it, take a moment to lift the whole pitcher up and inhale the fresh lemony bouquet--as heady as any spirit. I know what this beverage does for me on a cold wintry night, I can only imagine what it will do for me on a sweltering day in August.

Hoover's Cooking is a great family place, with interesting food for adults and plenty of

choices for even our ardently unadventurous 11-year-old eater. The remarkably inexpensive and alluring children's menu is a godsend for parents. My only recommendation is that they add a box of crayons to the crate of condiments at every table. The white butcher paper that covers the tables is crying out for a bit of pre-prandial creativity. Also, the service, while friendly, is still experiencing some glitches especially when the restaurant is busy. A distraction like Crayolas could be a comfort to those who struggle to deal with delayed gratification.

In short, Hoover's Cooking is a most welcome addition to our neighborhood. The parking is adequate for the time being, but given the generous portions, walking there is advisable! All the menu items are also available for carry-out. Make plans to visit Hoover's soon. I'll probably see you there.

History club uncovers neighborhood past

The Old North Central East (O.N.C.E.) Austin History Club has been in existence for several months now and is off to an enthusiastic start! Our mission is to document the history of the area bounded by Manor Road, Robert Mueller Airport, and IH-35, to educate neighbors and the general public about this history, and to promote community spirit and pride in the area.

Our first event, "ONCE Upon a Time...," a Community History Day, was a two-hour open house on November 7 at Asbury United Methodist Church. We exhibited historical information and partook in an enormous cake donated by Fiesta. After meeting many new people, we concluded that the event was a success and are planning to hold another one sometime in the spring.

Our research has turned up many interesting discoveries. We have delved into city and county maps dating from as far back as the 19th century and have linked our neighborhood's origins to influential landowners such as Bascom Giles, Jon Dancy, George Walling, Herman Schieffer, Dave Reed, and others (recognize any street names?). Did you know, for example, that there used to be a pond at the end of Pond Street, now Robinson Ave?

We have also gleaned information from neighborhood homeowners' Abstracts of Title. For instance, Joseph Wright, who was one of Austin's first physicians and was involved in locating the site for the University of Texas, lived where I-35 and Airport Boulevard currently intersect. We also learned from an old article in the *Austin-American Statesman* that the land occupied by Mueller Airport used to be a peach orchard owned by Nye Patterson (as in Patterson Park) before the city claimed it through eminent domain. We are currently interested in determining whether Bascom Giles' family home located next to St. George's Episcopal Church was originally built there or moved there later.

We have so many questions, and while we may not find answers to all of them, we will definitely have fun trying! We would like to share our knowledge with anybody who is interested and invite everyone to come to our meetings and to contribute historical information. Club meetings are held on the first or second Monday of each month at 6:00 p.m. at Asbury United Methodist Church. 

UT group studies Cherrywood traffic

transportation patterns near Maplewood Elementary. Although their report has no binding authority with the City of Austin, it does provide data and recommendations that could serve as ammunition as Cherrywood residents seek to make their streets safer.

In its analysis of transportation patterns, the report reveals several interesting facts. For example, an average of 1194 vehicles per hour travel on 38-1/2 Street past Lafayette during evening rush hour, almost 20 vehicles per minute. 754 vehicles per hour travel past the intersection of 38-1/2 and Maplewood each weekday morning, heavily congesting an area where many students are trying to get to school on foot. A survey of 26 Maplewood parents revealed that more than 33% of the students get to school on foot each day, and yet there are no sidewalks on the south side of 38-1/2 Street.

The report also notes the poor signage in the neighborhood as a whole. The writers state that "...few of the streets are numbered, and many of the streets change names outside of Cherrywood." They also point out that "Capitol Metro stops lack route maps and schedules and are a possible source of rider disorientation," and "Pedestrian signage is often lost in the competition of vehicular, regulatory, and commercial signs." To summarize, not only are there not enough meaningful signs in the neighborhood, but what signs exist are often extraneous and distracting.

The report makes recommendations for improving driver and pedestrian safety in the area. Some of these include building and widening sidewalks on 38-1/2 Street and Cherrywood Road, marking pavement with high-visibility crosswalks at congested intersections, painting bicycle lanes on 38-1/2 Street, removing outdated signs and trimming foliage near critical signs, installing traffic-calming devices on Clarkson Ave, and outlawing left turns from Lafayette onto 38-1/2 Street during rush hour in order to reduce cut-through traffic.

As Cherrywood neighbors who deal with traffic congestion everyday, there is little in the report that should surprise us. Nevertheless, to have a polished report with statistics and recommendations at our disposal can only help the CNA as it approaches the city for traffic solutions. We owe thanks to Nicole Betti, Jay Carini, Beth Fucci, Andrew Spurgin, Dana Stidham, and Kendall Swinford for choosing to study our community.

What a difference a year makes! The January '98 issue of *The Flea* reported that the Club's fledgling trap-spay-release efforts had netted two cats. Notes from the Chair



Please save yourself and your neighbors the potential trouble of having to report your loose canine.






