TRAFFIC CALMING

The Cherrywood Neighborhood Traffic Calming Working Group has met five times and has been working with the city and emergency services to investigate traffic calming solutions for the major arterials in the neighborhood. The relative effectiveness, cost and legal requirements of the various devices are becoming more apparent, and the group is tackling specifics. It is our goal to share our vision with the neighborhood before the end of the year.

Immediate solutions that you may have noticed are new and reversed stop signs and new street markings. City staff has heard our concerns over traffic on streets that are not emergency access corridors and has used a separate program to fund these welcome changes. You will notice new and reversed stop signs at the intersections of Werner and Concordia, Lafayette and Concordia, and 34th at Lafayette. New traffic counts show a 12 per cent reduction in speed coming off the stop sign at 34th and Lafayette. Look for more progress in the next few months.

The group is ready to work on the positioning of speed cushions, signs, striping, and other calming devices. Since the only recognized traffic calming method for emergency evacuation routes is speed humps, the working group had asked city staff to report what funds were left over after putting measures in place for these streets. As you will recall, it cost nearly our entire budget of \$300,000 to put cushions on 38½, Cherrywood, Clarkson, Maplewood and Wilshire. Each cushion costs approximately \$2,200.

Staff reported on some spacing varia-

tions, but the group could not endorse a final configuration. Smaller teams were selected to address problem areas such as 381/2 east of Cherrywood, Cherrywood south of 38½, the general area around Maplewood School, Clarkson, Wilshire/Schieffer, and other potential areas not already covered. At the Sept. 23 meeting, three proposals were recommended, and preliminary design specs from the city will be developed for the next meeting in late October. So far, we plan to put calming devices on 38½, Cherrywood, Wilshire, Schieffer, Lafayette, Werner, Robinson, Dancy and Clarkson. The complete traffic-calming plan will be circulated to all residents via a survey from the city before final adoption.

The city has agreed to re-measure several streets in our neighborhood for speed and volume by doing new counts now that UT is back in session. Several streets have been monitored in the past several weeks.

The next meeting of the traffic calming work group will be on Oct. 23. Look for an open house before the end of the year and a final update in the January Flea. If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to contact me at 322-0059 or at hydroplan@hotmail.com. ■

WEIRD, BUT WIRED

Visit the Cherrywood Web site by opening cherrywood.org. That's all you need. No URL. No http://. No www. Cherrywood.org all by itself will get you there. Easy to remember.

You'll find much local information. Austin Police Department emergency and city phones. Cherrywood Art Fair info. Neighborhood association committees. Neighborhood Watch. How to get on the e-mail list. Recommendations neighbors give for providers of services (housekeeping, plumbing, yard work, etc.)

Join the NeighborNet e-mail list. It posts reminders of neighborhood activities, postings about neighborhood concerns, notices of lost pets, garage sales, etc. Some venting of opinion from subscribers, as long as it's local. The list has 400 subscribers as of early September.



After four months of brainstorming and researching, Mueller has names for 44 streets.

The City of Austin and Catellus, the developer, working with the Austin History Center, identified the names to honor people who made significant contributions to Austin.

Criteria for selection were that the names reflected the city's diverse culture and history and represented "famous firsts" for Austin. No street could be named for a living person, and the names could not be similar to an existing street name because of the needs of emergency response agencies.

Mueller 201

On Aug. 25, about 100 people attended Mueller 201, a comprehensive project overview and update. The event was a follow-up to Mueller 101 in April. It was sponsored by the Mueller Neighborhoods Coalition and the City of Austin.

Jim Walker welcomed everyone and introduced Pam Hefner from the City of Austin and Greg Weaver of Catellus. Guests were encouraged to visit "topic tables" set up throughout the room. Topics included: Design Guidelines/Regional Retail led by Jim Adams of ROMA Design; Affordable Housing facilitated by Paul Hilgers and Greg Weaver; Community Governance led by Bob Burton; Construction led by Carl Paulson of Catellus; and Capital Metro's Long Range Transit Plan led by Capital Metro staff.

Each table was covered with butcher paper for guests to record their questions and comments, and feedback sheets were provided to capture this information.

Master Development Agreement

The City of Austin and Catellus con-

tinue to work toward the signing of the Master Development Agreement for Mueller. This agreement, which details the financial component, codes, covenants, restrictions, and zoning for the redevelopment, is projected to go to City Council for review at the end of October.

Other developments

—On Aug. 26, the City Council unanimously approved zoning for the entire Mueller redevelopment.

—The project Web site has been renamed www.muelleraustin.com. The site has construction updates and traffic information.

UPPER BOGGY CREEK PLANNING TEAM

At the Aug. 17 meeting, the Upper Boggy Creek Planning Team (UBCPT) agreed to support the Vortex Theater's request for a zoning change to allow beer and wine sales. The agreement requires a document be created to have the zoning revert to its current status if the property is sold. The owner will work with city staff to create the document.

The team decided to postpone action regarding the new planning tools because not all neighborhoods had made a decision regarding the tools and a new tool was available that none of the neighborhoods had reviewed. The

group agreed to review the tools before the next UBC meeting, when the team will address the issue.

The team discussed the CAMPO staff's decision not to follow the City of Austin's recommendation to downgrade Manor Road. The CAMPO board has been dealing with Austin's toll road issue and it is uncertain when it will take final action on the staff recommendation. It was decided that the neighborhoods and other interested parties would send letters to CAMPO board members expressing support for the Manor Road downgrade in October and follow with additional letters when it is placed on the agenda for action (maybe early in 2005).

A preliminary process regarding how the team will address planning and zon-

ing issues was presented. There was general support for the process, but it was decided that it needed to be more detailed. A more in-depth process will be presented at the next meeting.

The team discussed the height addition at St. David's Hospital. The hospital is asking for a variance on a project at 3000 N. Interstate 35 that would increase the allowable height for a medical office building from 60 feet to 175 feet. Additional review will be done, but the item is scheduled to go before the City of Austin's Board of Adjustment before UBC's next meeting, so each neighborhood will have to address it itself.

The next UBC meeting is at 6:30 p.m., Tuesday, Oct. 19, 2004, at Alamo Park on Alamo Street between 21st Street and 22nd Street. ■

CAP METRO'S Nov. 2 Ballot

The general election ballot asks whether Capital Metro should be allowed to operate passenger trains on its existing 32-mile freight rail line from Leander to downtown Austin. The passenger service, if approved, would be part of the bus/rail system.

This is the railroad track that goes through the Cherrywood Neighborhood.

The track crosses I-35 just east of Hancock Center, runs along the west side of Maplewood School and alongside Clarkson Avenue until it crosses Manor Road east of Randolph Street.

Under plans adopted by the Cap Metro board, the closest stops to our neighborhood would be on Martin Luther King Boulevard and at or near Highland Mall. There would be eight stops including Leander and downtown, and each stop would connect frequent "circulator" buses and/or "rapid buses."

The wording you will see on the ballot is:

"The operation of a fixed rail system by Capital Metropolitan Transportation Authority." For or Against.


Cap Metro has issued a "Notice of Election" that says:

"The purchase, acquisition, construction, operation and maintenance by Capital Metropolitan Transportation Authority of or relating to an urban commuter rail service between the Austin Convention Center and Leander, Texas, on an existing railroad line owned by Capital Metropolitan Transportation Authority. This starter urban

commuter rail service is part of the All Systems Go Long-Range Transit Plan of Capital Metropolitan Transportation Authority that also includes hike and bike trails along some existing railroad right-of-way, expanded local and express bus routes, new Rapid Bus routes and high frequency shuttle circulators that together provide connections to rail stops, new transit centers, new park-and-ride facilities, as well as major destinations in the Austin area, and would be implemented with no new or increased taxes and no issuance of bonds."

Based on overwhelmingly favorable response to a mid-August NeighborNet poll, the steering committee sent a letter to CapMetro reporting Cherrywood's apparently strong support of the All Systems Go plan.

CAP METRO RAIL PLAN AND THE BOGGY CREEK BIKEWAY

Sharp-eyed readers may have noticed Cap Metro's legal notice for the rail election (Statesman, Aug. 31) included "hike and bike trails along existing railroad right-of-way."

As the first component of the rail plan, Cherrywood's tracks top the list for rails WITH trails a relatively new idea that pairs multi-use trails with operating rail service—that is, the rails are not removed but are in use.

This concept has been successful in scores of projects throughout the United States, including the Cotton Belt Trail alongside DART tracks in Grapevine.

Cap Metro has indicated interest in making rail-trails a reality in Austin. On Aug. 19, I had the pleasure of touring the future "Red Line" in Cap Metro's rail-truck with the Texas Bicycle Coalition and our guest, nationally recognized bicycle planner and UT grad Mia Burke of Alta Planning.

Pedestrian and bicycle advocates are cautiously optimistic about cutting the ribbon on a new trail when Cap Metro's rail service becomes operable. That assumes that rail is approved on the November ballot.

At a public meeting Oct., 11 Cap Metro will present All Systems Go and its implications to cyclists. The meeting is hosted by Austin Cycling Association, Austin Metro Trails and Greenways, Downtown Austin Alliance, and Austin Parks Foundation. City staff will discuss other trail projects—the Lance Armstrong Bikeway and ideas to connect it to the future MoKan Railroad trail.

PLANNING AND ZONING

St. David's Health Care Tower

At Jack Newman's suggestion, we invited Bart Whatley, vice-chair of the Hancock Neighborhood Association, to present the position of that neighborhood on an application to change the height allowed in St. David's proposal from 60 to 175 feet. The committee voted Sept. 21 with 10 in favor, with one abstention, to support the Hancock Neighborhood position that the height should be limited to 120 feet. A letter was sent to the City Board of Adjustment stating our position, since there was not time to bring the matter to the Steering Committee nor the general membership. Neither Hancock Neighborhood Association nor St. David's Hospital is located in the Upper Boggy Creek Neighborhood Planning Area.

Upper Boggy Creek planning tools

We briefly reviewed the two planning tools favored by the Cherrywood Subdistrict of the Upper Boggy Creek Neighborhood Plan, one of which would limit impervious cover (concrete, asphalt, etc.) to 40 per cent in the front set-back area

of single family houses; and the other to allow open (covered and uncovered) front porches to encroach to within 15 feet of the front property line.

A third tool has been added by the Lisa Kocich, City of Austin neighborhood planner, who attended our meeting, confirmed that if it is not adopted along with the other two, we will have to wait two years before it could be reconsidered. This tool would limit the size and placement of garages and carports and, like the other two tools, would only apply to new construction. Basically, new carports and garages could not extend closer to the street than the front of the house and, if placed closer to the front facade than 20 feet, would be limited in width to half the width of the house. This tool is intended to reduce the proportion of the front yard used for parking cars, and to prevent "snout" garages.

The committee voted 6 in favor, 4 opposed, and 1 abstaining, to support this third tool. The Upper Boggy Creek Planning Team will decide Oct. 19 whether to adopt these three tools. The Steering Committee will vote Oct. 13 to establish our neighborhood's position on the third tool.


Airport Boulevard south of Schieffer

extends south from Schieffer along the west side of Airport Boulevard. It backs up to a tributary of Upper Boggy Creek and 10 homes on Vineland. Three homes on 40th Street abut the south end of the property.

A potential developer, misled by an error in the published Upper Boggy Creek Neighborhood Plan, has a contract to buy the property and has envisioned a project of condominiums above retail and offices. The developer has only recently learned that such a project is not allowed, because of the LO (office) zoning and a 1985 deed restriction that further restricts the uses and imposes design restrictions.

Before 1985 the property had been zoned SF3. The owners at that time wanted to develop it and came to agreement with the Schieffer Neighborhood Association, which did not become a part of CNA until the '90s. That agreement allowed LO zoning and the new deed restrictions, which can only be overturned by a two-thirds vote of the City Council. Ms. Kocich said the UBC plan will be amended to correct the error. So, unless and until further action is taken by UBC, it is likely that the property will remain undeveloped. The P&Z committee decided to discuss deed restrictions further. •

The class content can be anything related to student achievement, including any and all sciences, physical well being, etc. I specify because I am inviting community involvement in after-school classes by teaching our students a course in your expertise. Maplewood functions with a foundation philosophy of "green living." This is evident in curriculum emphasis as well

as extra-curricular activities provided for students. To support this effort and build on the fantastic science program that already exists, in large part due to expert kindergarten teacher Dr. Pauline Walker, our school is embarking on a partnership with the UT School of Architecture to create a "solar science lab." The lab will be a building that incorporates the use of solar power, rainwater collection, and recycled and alternative, environmentally friendly building materials. It will provide a unique opportunity for east Austin school children to see a project through from start to finish with a high level of expert review. The cost of construction of the lab is approximately \$200,000 and funds must be in place by mid-November for a summer construction start date. Teachers and parents have begun fundraising efforts, and we welcome support that any community members may be able to contribute. Please call 414-1086.


Willowbrook **R**each
