PARTNERSHIPS TO TAME LITTER AND CRIME

Throughout 2005, a major gateway in our neighborhood became an eyesore as litter and debris mounted. Meanwhile, there's been an increase of car break-ins. Is this coincidence? In Fixing Broken Windows: Restoring Order and Reducing Crime in Our Communities authors James Wilson and George L. Kelling wrote, "Some litter accumulates. Soon, more litter accumulates. Eventually, people even start leaving bags of trash from take-out restaurants there or breaking into cars."

The authors noted that as an area shows signs of neglect, vandals become more confident and intensify their harassment and vandalism. A vicious cycle then kicks in, attracting more serious offenders from outside of the area who sense that it has become a vulnerable and less risky site for crime. Studies have found that a sense of ownership of the streets lies at the heart of a successful neighborhood crime prevention program.

38½ Street near Interstate 35 belongs to whom? This street receives more foot traffic than any other section of our neighborhood. The trash generated on the first few blocks east of I-35 comes not only from the busy bus stop at Robinson but also from adjacent businesses (Fiesta, Chevron, the Party Stop) and transients.

Years ago neighbors gathered monthly to clean up the trash, but efforts were not sustainable. In December 2005 a win-win solution was created by neighbors concerned about this ongoing

littering trend. Funds were gathered and a neighborhood resident in need of work cleaned the area. Three cleanings resulted in 65 bags of debris from the three-block area on the south side of 38 $\frac{1}{2}$ Street between I-35 and Werner. The Cherrywood Neighborhood Association reimbursed us for the first two cleanings but does not have the funds to pay for ongoing maintenance.

Many factors contribute to this litter problem, which has grave implications for our neighborhood. A new committee has formed to create long-term solutions and it will be called the Cherrywood Gateway Committee.

Our short term goal will be maintenance. A few months of keeping the street clean will have a positive effect. A combination of paid and volunteer labor should be able to get the job done. Manor Road used to have more problems than 38½ Street, but now this street is thriving with many wonderful restaurants.

Capital Metro wants to support our efforts and has promised to perform daily maintenance at the bus stop on Robinson and 38½ Street. Businesses along this stretch don't necessarily have a stake in the Cherrywood neighborhood so residents are going to have to take the first steps. We will develop partnerships with the businesses along this street so they can become a part of the solution rather than the problem.

An immediate solution will be landscaping along the city right-of-away. Keep Austin Beautiful will provide support for this effort.

A long-term solution worth exploring is to have art installed along the street. Several people on NeighborNet liked this idea.

TRAFFIC CALMING

On January 18, Gordon Derr of the city Public Works Department commented on the progress of installing traffic calming devices in our neighborhood:

The implementation of the Cherrywood traffic-calming plan seems to be going well. 100+ cushions are in place of the planned 117. (Crews) are getting close to finishing all but (those on) East 38½ Street. Because of the higher speeds and volumes, they are awaiting traffic control setups before they move through there. That also will be moving forward fairly quickly. The end of next week, we will be using city forces to place large white thermo-plastic markings on the cushions and place reflective buttons to increase the visibility.

We have not heard any complaints about construction, so assume that no one was excessively hampered by the work crews. We have heard some positives and a lovely Christmas poem. If you have heard anything plus or minus, please let us know.

The Cherrywood Neighborhood Association has asked that the speed limit for the entire neighborhood be lowered to 25 mph, per HB 87. (We are looking at implementation for the entire area that was studied for neighborhood traffic calming.) Cherrywood south of the 38½, and 38½ west of Cherrywood would remain at their current speed limits because they are wider than 35 feet. Since this is the first request the city has gotten, it is taking a little time to develop procedures. We will keep you informed. ■

SAFETY COMMITTEE

A planned Safety Fair was postponed because of minimal interest from the neighborhood. The Safety Committee and Austin Police Department felt poor attendance would be counter-productive in our crime-fighting program.

APD has been forecasting an increase of crime for several years, but Cherrywood's anti-crime programs seem to have been successful keeping overall statistics pretty even. A 7 percent overall increase has occurred throughout Charlie East Division, which includes a large part of East Austin.

Senior Officer Sheldon Salisbury brings a new level of crime fighting to our community. Charlie Division Commander Nyert states, "APD's goal is to bring a better quality of life to East Austin neighborhoods."

The East Austin Crime Watch Newsletter is now being published as another tool to increase crime fighting in East Austin. The newsletter is being supported by the Austin Crime Commission headed by former Mayor Roy Butler, Sheriff Greg Hamilton and Grande Communications. Visit www.eastaustincrimewatch.org

The Safety Committee will review and make recommendations to the Steering Committee and general membership about additional programs to fight crime in the neighborhood. Neighborhood Watch Programs will continue to be supported, and a Cherrywood Technology Expo may be recommended for 2006. ■





MUELLER UPDATE

WEB SITE

The new Mueller Web site is live and running. It's a resource on all aspects of the community—the latest news, the plan, the site's history, amenities and both residential and commercial opportunities. As befits Austin's new urban village, we've included the work of hometown musicians and photographers. Log on at (www.muelleraustin.com).

MUELLER MILESTONES

- Early 2007: Mueller Central opens for business
- Summer 2007: Opening of the Dell Children's Medical Center of Central Texas
- Fall 2007: First Mueller homes go on sale.

THE GREENWAY

Plans call for approximately 75 acres of land around the perimeter of Mueller to be a multi-use greenway system. These landscaped areas will accommodate recreation with walking and bike trails, picnic groves, ponds and sport fields. They also will serve the important ecological function of detaining and filtering storm water before it enters the creek systems of East Austin.

HOMES AT MUELLER

Catellus is working with homebuilders who want to be part of Mueller's first neighborhoods. We will select the initial homebuilders in Spring 2006.

CONSTRUCTION UPDATE

Signs are clearly visible. You can really get a sense of the architecture at the new Dell Children's Medical Center of Central Texas, at the southwest corner of Mueller and Barbara Jordan boulevards. The children's hospital is expected to open for business in June 2007.

Both Mueller and Barbara Jordan Boulevards, as well as Lancaster Drive serving the northwest quadrant of the community, are complete and open to the public. The next phase of road and infrastructure construction will begin this spring.

Deconstruction has started on some of the remaining hangars and runways west of Mueller Boulevard. Work will soon begin on the creation of the pond area for Lake Park, the recreational hub adjoining the Mueller Town Center. Lake Park is also home to Mueller Central, the community information center and headquarters, which is scheduled to open in early 2007.

SERVING THE COMMUNITY AT MUELLER

The Salvation Army has announced plans for a \$90 million, 100,000-square-foot community center to be built at Mueller. This facility is being made possible by the financial support of the estate of Joan Kroc, widow of Ray Kroc, founder of McDonald's, which has earmarked \$1.5 billion for the construction of "Kroc Centers" across the country.

UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS SYSTEM UPDATE

For the last year, UT System leaders Drs. Ken Shine and Jack Stobo have met regularly with Mueller neighbors to discuss a potential academic health research campus and address concerns and issues associated with a presence in the redevelopment. The health campus would involve research and education facilities and would likely locate near the Dell Children's Medical Center of Central Texas. None of this will happen, however, without serious philanthropic involvement.

ASBURY FOOD DONATIONS EXCEEDS 7 TONS

The monthly Food Bank Drive conducted by Asbury United Methodist Church was able to contribute more than 1,400 pounds of food to the Capital Area Food Bank in 2005 in partner-

ship with the Cherrywood Neighborhood Association.

The food bank serves 21 Central Texas counties including Travis, providing food to local agencies helping the poor. It distributed 1.5 million pounds of food to Katrina victims last fall. In Travis County, 2,500 families are served. The majority of the poor and hungry are women with small children, so this year we added baby food, formula and diapers to the list, and we're

beginning to see more of that in the last two months.

Melvin Walenta, a Cherrywood resident and member of the church, has been the driving force behind this work. Asbury receives food donations the second Sunday of every month between 9 a.m. and noon. FRIENDS OF PATTERSON PARK

The city Parks and Recreation department has scheduled construction of the trail in Patterson Park. The most

problematic area of the trail, the section along Genesis Presbyterian Church property just outside of the park at the corner of Wilshire and Schieffer, will be engineered by Public Works, and will include curb and gutters along Wilshire, which also will correct an erosion prob-



lem. Money has been committed for this work, but the City Council must approve awarding of the contract. This is expected in February, leading to a March start of c o n s t r u c -

tion. Barring weather delays, construction on this part is to be completed by end of May. PARD is waiting for this section of the trail to reach a certain point before beginning trail work within the park to ensure that the two sections properly align.

Friends of Patterson Park will meet with PARD as construction begins to discuss the final trail layout and other amenities, such as water fountains and barriers to motorized vehicles. After construction is completed, Friends of Patterson Park will organize volunteers to assist with trail grooming.

9TH TREE PLANTING GOES TO CONCORDIA TRIANGLE

On Saturday, Oct. 15, six volunteers planted more than 20 trees during the ninth annual Cherrywood tree planting.

Our grand total for nine years is 245 trees.

A special part of our planting this year added nine trees to Concordia Triangle. With a grant from Keep Austin Beautiful, we received funds to plant three Texas mountain laurels, three crepe myrtles, two red oaks, and one Chinese pistache. These trees will make a lasting addition to the triangle, replacing an old cedar tree that fell and was removed last year. Volunteers helping out this year were: Karen Johnson, Kristy Gregg, Kari Bourland, Jon Gabriel, Glenn Reed, Mike Sullivan and Mike Damal.

The trees are in the ground. However the severe drought conditions have not been kind to newly planted trees. I have been watering these trees, but I am soliciting help to water the trees on Concordia Triangle. We need to keep them watered for the next two years if they are to survive and prosper. I am looking for individuals who live around the Triangle to volunteer their water spigot from time to time, and I am asking others to help water these trees.

In drought conditions like we have now, a thorough watering twice a week is sufficient in the winter, once a week when summer comes. During periods of good rains, watering will not be necessary. MARQUEE SIGN

At CNA's Feb. 15 meeting, one agenda item will be whether to con-


tribute an additional sum to an important sign project.

Last fall, CNA appropriated \$1,000 toward a lit marquee sign at the Asbury United Methodist Church corner, $38\frac{1}{2}$ Street and Cherrywood Road. We might need \$600 more to finish the job. The church has contributed \$1,400. Both Asbury and CNA would use the sign for announcements. "Building community" could take a big step forward if the sign happens.

The marquee would be added to the existing wrought iron version. The lines of interchangeable letters could be used to remind passers-by of neighborhood events such as the art fair, awards, creek clean-up, elections, exhibits, meetings, plant exchange, pot lucks, tree planting, and other projects.

This would be more a "reminder" medium than an "announcement" medium. Community events generally would be known already, having been publicized in *The Flea* and on *NeighborNet*. But the sign would multiply the impact. And for folks not yet tuned in to the newsletter or the listserv, it might be actual news that CNA exists and is active.

The proposed location is good. It would be easily readable by motorists approaching the stop signs at the intersection. And it would be softly lit at night. We would designate someone to be responsible for timely updates. ■

The Good Foods concept was created by a small committee and would provide free fresh fruits and veggies to children twice daily as snacks. Also included in the Good Foods program are plans for after-school cooking classes and wellness fairs for the Maplewood community each semester.

Maplewood's basketball and softball teams won the After School Olympics, competing against schools that are part of the $21^{\rm st}$ Century Program. The trophy was presented to athletes at the January PTA meeting. We are very proud of those students for not only competing and winning, but also for the great sportsmanship they showed toward other schools and each other.

Maplewood's Spring Fling is tentatively scheduled April 8. Spring Fling is an all-day family event with ice cream, live music and activities booths. The famous Spring Fling Basket Raffle, with baskets full of goodies for mom, dad to the wee ones, will feature \$1 tickets, and every dime goes to Maplewood. 

It's party time again






"The more that you read, the more things that you will know. The more that you learn, the more places you'll go." - Dr. Seuss.
